



Create exciting quilts using 2½" fabric strips and various rulers.

Chevron quilt



For this chevron quilt Kerry used 20 strips, four of which she set aside for the borders.


Kerry chain-pieced 4 strips together four times - she now had four sets of strips. Place two sets right sides together.



With the ruler right side up and the 45° angle mark on middle seam, trim off the end. Normally you would now turn the fabric around to measure and commence cutting more strips.

Kerry uses two rulers the **Strip Tube Ruler** and the **Miniline Plus Ruler** to save you time.

Both these rulers can be purchased online from www.kiwiquilts.co.nz



Using the **Miniline Plus Ruler** measure 2 ½" from angled cut edge. Place **Strip Tube Ruler**'s longest edge next to it then take away the **Miniline Plus Ruler** and using your rotary cutter, cut against the **Strip Tube ruler**.

This helps to keep the angle accurate and saves movement in the fabric. Also saves time fiddling with your ruler to place the 45° mark in the right place. **Great idea Kerry!**

Lay up the strips on your design wall. You can leave alternate colours on each row or Kerry turned each piece so the colours are on each row.



Join the short strips together into long strips, the length of your quilt.

Now sew the strips together in pairs, see picture above. You may like to press your long seams open.



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
